Membership, Programs, and Services

1. Membership Diversification: While the AAHCP's membership remains small (just over 700 members), we are delighted with the growth in diversity of our membership, reflecting the diversity of interest in our field. Today, Nurse Practitioners, Registered Nurses, Physician Assistants, Geriatric Care Managers, Social Workers, and Pharmacists make up 21 percent of the Academy's membership.

2. Building and Documenting Qualifications

a. The Home Care Credentialing Examination:

This self-study examination, taken over from the

American Board of Internal Medicine, gives home care
medical professionals (MDs, NPs, PAs, and others) the
opportunity to gain a credential that will document
their advanced qualification in this field. To date, 47
home care medical providers have passed the exam.

The Academy also developed a **bibliography of articles relating to home care** that also serves as a study guide for the exam.

b. The Faculty Development Seminar: In the seminars, invited faculty who teach residents are given a program to acquaint them with options for teaching house calls and home care medicine to residents. This year, successful seminars were held in Philadelphia and Richmond, VA. The Residency Training Faculty Development Seminar Materials are available for those interested in hosting.

3. Developing Best Practice Guidelines and Recommendations and Member Recognition

- **a. Guidelines:** *Wound Care Guidelines* began development in 2004 and are expected to be published in 2005. The guidelines cover recommendations for recognizing, assessing, treating, and monitoring unintended weight loss in homebound patients, accounting for both the advantages and limitations of care in the home setting.
- b. Booklets: The Academy's popular booklets "Making Home Care Work in Your Practice" and "Making House Calls A Part of Your Practice" were updated.

c. Medical Direction of Home Care Agencies: "Medical Directorship of Home Health Agencies," written for physicians who either are or are considering becoming medical directors for home care agencies, covers topics such as the role of the medical director; rules, regulations, and standards; billing and reimbursement; Stark regulations; and includes sample contracts and forms. In addition, the Medical Director Binders that were developed for the course given in the last 1990s are available for purchase as well as Communication Templates to facilitate doctor-nurse communication. - d. Annual Scientific Meeting and Member Recognition: Called "Keeping the Home Fires Burning", the 2004 program included presentations on pain management, wound care, proactive health technologies for the home, billing and payment issues, and a legal update. Winners of the House Call Doctor of the Year Award was Benneth Husted, DO, and of the Clinician of the Year Award, nurse practitioner Whitney Doiron.
- e. Newsletter: This year's bi-monthly editions have covered new models of house call practices, making the case for support to Academic medical centers, Medicare fraud and abuse management, abstracts of the home care literature, and a variety of public policy, clinical and practice management topics. The Newsletter continues to be a valuable resource to all working in the field.
- **4. Public Policy:** We began a renewed effort to raise payments for domiciliary care codes. We continue to track development in the CMS chronic care programs for opportunities to shape policy and represent members having issues with the CMS payment process.
