### Describe an anecdote that would be of interest to your colleagues

Like most 21-year-olds, I told her to stop telling me what to do and ignored her. Almost 2 frustrating years later, I sent letters to every veterinary hospital in the city that saw birds hoping I could volunteer or get my foot in the door. I got 1 response, took the job immediately, and fell in love with all of it. It wasn't until almost a year into that job that my mom and I realized that it was the same hospital owned by the woman my mom told me about years before! Proof that fate is real... or, that we should listen to our mothers.
