

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President's Message

By the time this newsletter is distributed, we will be close to receiving our November election ballots in the mail (some counties may still have precinct voting). If you haven't heard about the "Bad 3 Bad 4 Libraries" yet, you should sit down and research Amendments 60 and 61 and Proposition 101 (<http://bad3bad4libraries.blogspot.com>).

These initiatives will be on the November ballot and if all three pass would devastate Colorado governments, schools, police departments, libraries, colleges, fire service and more. I can't remember a time when I've felt so scared about ballot measures. Not only am I afraid for my library (Douglas County Libraries), I'm gravely concerned about the school districts, local businesses, job losses, home values, and CAL. We've built our lives here. We have jobs we love and CAL is a part of what I love about my profession.

I'm sure I am no different from our other members in feeling a sense of pride in being a librarian. I love the work I do at Douglas County Libraries (DCL). I've watched this district go from a group of small branches to an award-winning library serving 300,000 people. I don't want to see my system or any other library in Colorado suffer. If all three measures pass, DCL would lose 58 percent of its revenue. How much would your library lose?

The CAL Legislative Committee wrote a Resolution in Opposition to Amendments 60, 61 and Proposition 101. The CAL Board approved

the Resolution on September 10.

We must gather together with our external advocates and send the message that libraries are important! You can use the Resolution when talking to people. Let them know that the library community in Colorado is against all three.

One of the keynote speakers at the CAL conference, Rick Ridder will talk to us about these initiatives and the progress being made on the campaign to defeat them.

CALCON10-We are weeks away from the CAL Conference in Loveland. The Conference Committee has done yeoman's work getting a conference together in only eleven months. This year we are offering high quality, diverse programs for attendees. Stephen Sweeney and his committee worked very hard to put together over fifty professional development sessions, nationally known keynote speakers, colleague poster sessions, and an impressive array of vendors for the exhibits. American Association of School Librarians (AASL)

The Planning Guide Module

“A Planning Guide for Empowering Learners” is a program evaluation, planning, implementation, and advocacy tool that will ensure school library program planners go beyond the basics to provide goals, priorities, criteria, and general principles for establishing effective library programs. The guide includes a revised “School Library Program Rubric,” a tool that allows school librarians to assess their program on 16 different sets of criteria.

AASL joined with Britannica Digital Learning to co-publish the online, interactive school library program-planning module. As a complement to AASL’s “Empowering Learners: Guidelines for School Library Programs,” the tool will change school library program development and implementation, saving time and delivering data.

It includes a “School Library Program Assessment Rubric” that will allow school librarians to assess their program according to 16 different sets of criteria. By using the rubric to identify strengths and weaknesses within their programs, school librarians can better develop goals, objectives and action plans to meet the needs of their school community. Data from the rubric will automatically generate charts and graphs that can be shared with school community stakeholders in advocating for the school library program.

Subscriptions are \$40 for the first year; renewals are \$20 per year. AASL members receive a 10-percent discount on subscriptions. AASL will also offer bulk pricing for districts ordering the module, and purchase orders will be accepted. Ordering arrangements are also available to higher education bookstores. Ballot Initiatives Impacting Statewide Library Services

Hopefully, this is not news to you – 3 ballot initiatives – Amendments 60, 61 and Proposition 101 are three anti-tax measures that, if approved at the November 2, 2010 Statewide Election, will significantly cut funding for services throughout the state of Colorado. The following summary of the impacts of these initiatives was developed by Jacqueline Murphy from Seter & Vander Wall, PC, Chris Brogan, a Colorado library finance professional (on her own time), and Jamie Helgren, DU Research Fellow, Library Research Service.

Amendment 60:

Library Districts are generally 80% to 95% funded through property tax revenues. If Amendment 60 passes, Colorado library districts could lose approximately \$57 million in property tax collections (or 35.65% of total property tax revenues for library districts) for the year 2011.¹ The revenue decrease is due to a downward adjustment of mill levies, ranging from no decrease at all, to a whopping 84.19% decrease, depending upon assessed valuation fluctuations and TABOR waivers and other electoral authorization. Recalculating mill levies to the year a library waived TABOR limitations will be significant for some, devastating for others.

County and municipal libraries are not included in this calculation if they do not derive revenues from a property tax. Jefferson County Public Library is an exception, which is funded by a county-controlled property tax, and projects trimming \$1.4 million from its budget over the next four years if 60-61-101 pass. City libraries have already had to significantly cut library budgets in this economy; passage of

60-61-101 will exacerbate an already bleak funding situation. For example, the City of Littleton has projected a 3% across the board cut, resulting in a \$67,000 loss to the City library affecting services to the public, and possibly mandating staff cuts.²

Mill levy issues, if any, raised by Amendment 60 regarding library district boards (which are appointed by city and county governing bodies), will need to be resolved in a future legislative session. Depending on the outcome, libraries may be forced to divert their already decreased revenues to funding regular board elections instead of computers, materials and programming for their patrons.

Amendment 61:

Library Districts generally finance construction or renovation of library buildings through Certificates of Participation (COPs). Under Amendment 61, library district revenues must be reduced by the amount of revenue needed to make lease payments once the financing is repaid. Construction of new library facilities and/or renovation of existing facilities that previously would have been feasible using available tax revenues, will not take place, absent voter approval, resulting in less meeting space, computers and space for additional materials.

Funding pursuant to the Better Denver Bond Program, which has included city library capital projects, may not have been feasible if the statewide measures had been in place.³

Library districts are able to achieve cost savings for vehicles and equipment such as computers and copiers through lease purchase contracts. If 61 passes, libraries would lose this savings if they need

voter approval for leasing vehicles, computers and copiers.

Proposition 101:

When fully implemented in the year 2014, Proposition 101 stands to impact Colorado libraries by reducing their share of specific ownership tax revenues by 98%. Based on a straw poll of around 20 library systems, Prop 101 could cause Colorado libraries to lose between \$17,600 to \$1.4 million per year, depending on the size of the community, beginning in 2014.

By targeting telecommunication fees, rural Colorado would lose critical funding to maintain phone and internet access, harming rural libraries where library computer facilities often provide a community's only access to computer/internet service.

Conclusion

If any of these measures pass, libraries will need to reduce costs including laying off staff, reducing library hours and buying fewer computers, books and DVDs. Library reduced hours are in addition to reduced hours at senior centers and recreation centers that may result from municipal and special district funding cuts caused by 60-61-101.
