REFORMA Colorado: REFORMA Colorado held its 2nd Mini-conference at the Denver Public Library in April. It was very successful in terms of programming and registrants. We more than doubled the number of registrants from 40 to 80! Also, the Translation Committee translated 11 documents from English to Spanish with an average of 2-3 days turnover with clients from the High Plains Library District, the Lieutenant Governor's Office, Colorado State Library, and Jefferson County Public Libraries.

9th Edition of Intellectual Freedom Manual to be released in June 2015: Look forward to the 9th edition of the Intellectual Freedom Manual which will include updated interpretations to the Library Bill of Rights.

Updated interpretations include: "Prisoners' Right to Read"; "Restricted Access to Library Materials"; "The Universal Right to Free Expression"; "Challenged Materials"; "Expurgation of Library Materials"; "Access to Resources and Services in the School Library Media Program"; "Free Access to Libraries for Minors"; "Minors and Internet Interactivity"; "Diversity in Collection Development"; "Labeling and Rating Systems"; "Exhibit Spaces and Bulletin Boards"; "Importance of Education to Intellectual Freedom"; "Intellectual Freedom Principles for Academic Libraries;" and "Privacy."

Why We Should Know about the Workforce Investment and Opportunity Act (WIOA):

Sailing through both the Senate and House with bipartisan support, the 2014 version of the WIO includes public libraries. Assuming the President signs this act, the following provisions fall into place for libraries:

- Public libraries are to be considered additional One-Stop partners. Libraries will have access to federal funding for job training and job search programs.
- State and Local Workforce Boards must include plans to improve digital literacy skills at One-Stop delivery systems.
- Federal supervision or control over selection of library resources is prohibited.
- Authorizes adult education and literacy activities provided by public libraries as an allowable statewide employment and training activity.
- Includes a definition of "workforce preparation activities" that specifically includes digital literacy skills.

If signed, the hard work for libraries is proving this measure was needed by applying for and using the newly available funds. <u>ALA press release</u>

Look Forward to a Survey about Erate!

FCC Chair, Tom Wheeler, announced via video that library staff will be asked to complete a survey outlining anticipated needs for the next 5 years in terms of computer and wireless provision – to be used by FCC to update eRate distributions. Look for an email alert arriving later this fall!
