



The 2009 Convention: A Call to Service

The theme of our annual convention this year centered on an important feature of the vocation of a canonist: our cooperative service in the Vineyard of Lord. Just as service can take many forms, so also did our conversations and our presentations deal with many different areas of service.

When thinking of service, we often think of individuals, and this year we thought of two members of our society: Sr. Sharon Holland, IHM, and Rev. Lawrence DiNardo. Sharon was recognized with an honorary membership for her service to our Society, to the Roman curia and to the whole Church. Her investment of her faith and her life has helped vowed religious and all members of the people of God. Larry received the Role of Law award for his work not just as a canonist in his own diocese but also across the nation. The energy that he brings to his life, he also brings to leadership and to his responsibilities.

The major addresses all approached the theme of service from different disciplines. The first address by a theologian and woman religious, Dr. Susan Wood, SCL, reminded us all of our common Baptism; the sacrament

that all receive involves all in service in the church. The second address, also by a vowed religious, Br. Loughlan Sofield, ST, brought together faith and human dynamics; he reminded us that canonical norms involve human situations and not just abstract categories. The final address, by Rev. Lawrence DiNardo, faced a situation that we all face today; the canonical staffing of a tribunal has to recognize the diversity of individuals and resources in each portion of the people of God.

The other formal presentations developed our shared call to service; they discussed collaboration, encountering differences, and understanding our past as we move into the future. Both of the pre-Convention Workshops dealt with collaboration, new realities and a future learning from the past. As we deal with the increasing number of penal trials, it is our experience of matrimonial jurisprudence that we rely on as we begin. No matter what the question presented to the tribunal in the formal petition, all have to work together in facing the current

He also called upon all of us to remember that "service in and to the Canon Law Society of America is as important to our ministry as the competency and conviction we all desire." What a great challenge for all of our membership as we anticipate the full implementation during the coming year of our Future Initiatives Project (FIP) that was affirmed at our 2008 Convention.

Apostolic Constitution *Anglicanorum coetibus* Providing for Personal Ordinariates for Anglicans Entering into Full Communion with the Catholic Church: Some Initial Observations¹

Introduction

On November 4, 2009 Pope Benedict XVI promulgated the aforementioned apostolic constitution containing thirteen norms along with fourteen complementary norms. An introductory section notes that the divisions among Christians contradict the Church's fundamental call to be a sign and instrument of unity of human beings with God and with one another. The Spirit-based communion of believers is invisible but also needs visible expression in a common faith, sacraments, and governance. While the Church of Christ subsists in the Catholic Church, elements of sanctification and truth are found in other Christian communions. And such elements have led certain Anglicans to seek full communion in a corporate fashion.

The apostolic constitution and the complementary norms establishing a basic structure for personal Anglican ordinariates represent the pope's response to these requests. Subsequently the basic principles articulated in the two documents will need to be concretized in more specific statutes responding to local conditions. Such a flexible canonical structure under the supervision of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF) is somewhat comparable to military ordinariates.² Both are personal (not primarily territorial) structures designed to foster pastoral care; they are equivalent to dioceses; and they are types of particular churches. However, the Anglican ordinariates differ from the military ordinariates since they constitute an exceptional response to a special pastoral situation.

The basic rationale for these relatively new juridical structures is to maintain the richness of the Anglican liturgical,

spiritual, and pastoral tradition while integrating it within the Catholic communion for our mutual enrichment. Such a tradition is viewed as a particular reality within the Latin Church; hence these new structures are not considered comparable to Eastern *sui iuris* churches. The present norms differ from the June 20, 1980 CDF Pastoral Provision addressing the same pastoral issue since that text integrated Anglicans coming into full Catholic communion into existing dioceses under the pastoral care

of the diocesan bishop whereas the present norms envision a new structure to meet the same pastoral objectives.

Structure of Documents

The thirteen norm *apostolic constitution* may be divided into four general headings for systematic purposes:

(1) General background issues:

- (a) Establishment of ordinariates; location and principal church;

- juridic personality (I, 1-3; XIII)
- (b) Governing norms: apostolic constitution; complementary norms; specific ordinariate norms drawn up in light of aforementioned documents (II)
- (2) Ordinary: papal appointment and power (IV-V)
- (3) Members: laity, clergy, and religious (I, 4); clergy (VI)³; religious (VII)⁴; request for full communion by laity and religious (IX)
- (4) Exercise of triple *munera* within ordinariate:
- (a) *Munus docendi*: Catechism as authoritative expression of faith (I, 5)
- (b) *Munus sanctificandi*: Liturgical options: Roman rite and approved Anglican liturgical books (III)
- (c) *Munus regendi*:
1. Establishment of personal parishes by ordinary and role of pastors in ordinariate and with pastors of local diocese (VIII)
 2. Activity of councils: governing, financial, and pastoral (X)
 3. Quinquennial report and *ad limina* visit (XI)
 4. Resolution of judicial cases (XII)

The fourteen *Complementary Norms* may likewise be divided into four general headings:

- (1) Holy See jurisdiction: CDF especially but other dicasteries (art.1)
- (2) Role of ordinary:
- (a) Relationship to Episcopal conference and local diocesan bishop (art. 2-3)
- (b) Eligibility for office; incardination of clerics; establishment of deaneries (art. 4, 1-3)
- (3) Laity and religious (presumably non-clerical): admission to ordinariate and pastoral or charitable collaboration within local diocese (art. 5, 1-2)
- (4) Clergy:
- (a) Other than bishops: eligibility for orders/faculties (art. 6, 1-3); remuneration/support/possible secular employment (art.7, 1-3);

eligibility for membership on presbyteral/pastoral councils of local diocese (art. 8, 1-2); pastoral collaboration in local diocese (art. 9, 1-3); formation: seminary with diocesan seminarians and continuing education with diocesan clerics (art. 10, 1-5)

- (b) Former Anglican bishops (art. 11, 1-4): eligibility of married former Anglican bishop to be Ordinary after presbyteral ordination; role of former Anglican bishops in assisting Ordinary, participating in Episcopal conference, and using insignia of Episcopal office.
- (5) Exercise of *munus regendi*: the governing council (art. 12, 1-5); the pastoral council (art. 13, 1-2); the establishment of personal parishes (art. 14, 1-3).

Some notable features of the documents

Apostolic constitution

1. Those belonging to the Ordinariate are those originally Anglican laity, clerics, and religious who are now in full communion and those receiving the sacraments of initiation within the Ordinariate (I, 4).
2. Those belonging to the Ordinariate may celebrate, besides the Roman Rite, the various liturgical rites according to the Anglican liturgical books approved by the Holy See (III).
3. The Anglican Ordinary, unlike the Military Ordinary,⁵ exercises vicarious not proper power in the name of the pope (V, b).
4. The Ordinary may admit to orders in the Church Anglican clerics meeting canonical specifications. Married Anglican clerics must observe *Sacerdotalis coelibatus*, n. 42 affirming the principle of celibacy for Catholic presbyters but admitting the possibility of exceptions for ministers from other traditions entering into full communion. Unmarried Anglican ministers must observe celibacy (c. 277, 1) (VI, 1).
5. In principle only celibate men may be admitted to the presbyterate; but

the Ordinary may petition the pope for a dispensation from canon 277, 1 so married men may be ordained presbyters according to objective criteria and the needs of the Ordinariate. The Ordinary determines such criteria in consultation with the Episcopal Conference; they must also be approved by the Holy See (VI, 2; Complementary Norms, art. 6, 1).

6. Generally candidates for orders in the Ordinariate should be formed theologically along with other seminarians; yet with the consent of the Governing Council, the Ordinary may establish special houses and programs of formation to nurture future clerics in aspects of the Anglican patrimony in harmony with the Catholic tradition (VI, 5; Complementary Norms, art.10, 2).
7. The Ordinary needs to consult the local bishop and obtain the consent of the Holy See before establishing personal parishes (VIII, 1).
8. A key institute of Ordinariate governance is the Governing Council whose statutes are approved by the Ordinary and confirmed by the Holy See (X, 1). This body of at least six priests assumes the role of the presbyteral council (cc. 495-501) and the college of consultors (c. 502) and exercises other significant functions mentioned in the Complementary Norms.
9. The Ordinary must establish a pastoral council to consult the faithful (X, 4).
10. For judicial cases the competent tribunal is that of the diocese of the domicile of one of the parties unless the Ordinariate constitutes its own tribunal; if so, the Ordinariate designates its appellate tribunal with Holy See approval (XII).

Complementary Norms

1. The Ordinary may be a bishop or presbyter appointed by the pope *ad nutum Sanctae Sedis* based on a terna presented by the Governing Council (art 4, 1).
2. The Ordinary may incardinate former Anglican ministers now in full com-

- munion or candidates in the Ordinariate promoted by him (art. 4, 2).
3. The Ordinary may establish deaneries after consulting the Episcopal conference and receiving the consent of the Governing Council and the Holy See (art. 4, 3).
 4. Those previously baptized as Catholics outside the Ordinariate are not ordinarily eligible for membership unless their family belongs to it (art. 5, 1).
 5. Ordained Catholic ministers who have become Anglicans are not eligible for ministry in the Ordinariate; this is likewise true for Anglican clergy in irregular marriage situations (art. 6, 2).
 6. When necessary, the Ordinary may permit his priests to engage in secular employment compatible with their ministerial obligations (art. 7, 3).
 7. A married former Anglican bishop may be appointed Ordinary after being ordained a Catholic presbyter; he subsequently exercises pastoral and sacramental ministry within the Ordinariate with full jurisdictional authority (art. 11, 1).
 8. Former Anglican bishops belonging to the Ordinariate may assist the Ordinary and participate in Episcopal conference meetings like retired bishops (art. 11, 2-3); former Anglican bishops not ordained Catholic bishops may wear Episcopal insignia (art. 11, 4).
 9. The Ordinary also needs the Governing Council's approval to admit a candidate for orders or erect or suppress a personal parish (art. 12, 2a-b). It has a deliberative vote in proposing to the Holy See changes in the Complementary Norms of the Ordinariate and in formulating its own statutes, those of the Pastoral Council, and the Rule for houses of formation (art. 12, 4, b-c).

situation.

In her seminar on the relationship of victim assistance personnel and canonical personnel in a diocese, Amy Jill Strickland noted that these two areas of responsibility are not in competition with each other. In discussing the obligation of a diocese to a cleric who has been removed, Rev. Patrick Laggis observed that while the issue of money may be very emotional, the cleric and the diocese are not rivals. Sr. Therese Guerin Sullivan, SP,

dealt with collaboration directly in a seminar that discussed it as an essential feature of the sacramental life of the church, as did the seminar on the theory and practice of working together in sponsorship that was conducted by Rev. Warren Brown, OMI, and Sr. Rosemary Smith, SC.

As our world becomes increasingly heterogeneous, it creates interactions that we must deal with as canonists. In the seminar on the Mormon structure of marriage, Rev. Langes Silva discussed the encounter of our Church with a different understanding of what can be an essential part of the lives of the faithful. In any discussion of Catholic laity in the United States, the increasing presence of non-Latins has to be considered; Rev. Jobe Abbass, OFM, conv., presented that in the seminar on the Eastern canons. Even Australian Rev. Ian Waters' discussion of suggested revisions of procedural law after twenty-five years took into account the different circumstances that the Church encounters today.

As we move into the future, we have to understand our past. In preparation and formation for ministry, admitting to our past is an important part of building the future; that was the sense of Msgr. Craig Cox's seminar. Similarly, Rev. John Beal's seminar on error discussed whether this traditional ground in matrimonial jurisprudence might be more contemporary than we would imagine as we encounter our present-day culture. The

past is often a resource for the future, which is why Rev. James Donlon used the contrasting words of 'traditional' and 'contemporary' in titling his seminar on the Promoter of Justice. Even how we archive the paper what we have already created is significant; that is way the work of Br. Patrick Shea, OFM, Christine Taylor, Jac Treanor and Rev. Manuel Viera, OFM is so important.

Our annual convention is not just a time to gather; it is a time to learn, to assess and to renew – not just ideas, but ourselves as canonists in service to the Church, in the Vineyard of the Lord. ▼
