New Website Member Benefits Help Increase Membership

As we approach the time for the 2010 convention in Buffalo, there is much activity in the Office of Executive Coordinator in preparation for the meeting. This summer has been busy and, despite the extreme heat in the Washington, DC area, we have also been able to enjoy some time away from Washington!

Convention registration is going well. The high quality of the convention program and the simultaneous meeting with the Canadian Canon Law Society has attracted many to want to be part of this year's activities.

With the recent appointment of the chair and membership of the CLSA Consecrated Life Committee, the committee restructuring recommended by the Future Initiatives Project has been completed. The new committees are quickly becoming active, utilizing conference calls, in-person meetings, and looking into other options for enhancing communication among their members such as webinars and video-conferencing. This activity bodes well for the Society's future and its service in addressing the canonical needs of the Church. To help members become more acquainted with the work of the CLSA committees, we plan to highlight individual committees and their activities in each issue of the CLSA Newsletter. Elsewhere in this issue you will find articles on the new Committee on Church Governance and the Committee on Laity.


As you may recall, it was July of 2009 when we launched the new CLSA website. Since that time we have made numerous improvements in the site including the addition of canon law resources available

to both members and non-members. With Katie Richards' (CLSA Executive Assistant) knowledge of websites as well as Susan Mulheron's (CLSA Student Intern) experience we have been able to generate a significant amount of "traffic" throughout the site. The members' services on the website are numerous and we continue to look for new ways to encourage members and groups such as CLSA committees to utilize its features.

The CLSA website has been particularly instrumental in our efforts to increase membership in the Society. Though we anticipated some growth through accessibility of the website, we did not anticipate the extent of growth it has produced. The increase in the number of new members of

represent 33 countries and 6 continents. The three countries most represented, besides the United States are Canada (with 51 members), the United Kingdom and Italy (with 25 each).

Since July 1, 2010, and an additional 24 new members have joined the Society, already exceeding the projected number for the current year. Our newest members generally find out about the Society from the website and the vast majority apply for membership through the website. Additionally, the increasing number of new student memberships (36%) speaks well for the future of the Society. These student members are generally electronically astute and quite familiar with navigating the website and utilizing many of its features,

the Society this past year far exceeded our projection. Ninety-four (94) new members joined during the past fiscal year, more than one quarter of whom come from countries other than the United States. This international diversity among the membership is a positive development which enables the Society to reach out to canonists throughout the world. Our international members

Outline of Revised *Sacramentorum sanctitatis tutela*

The outline should to be read in connection with a careful examination of the revised *Sacramentorum sanctitatis tutela* and the procedural norms issued by the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith on July 15, 2010.

Bold-faced text = changes from original SST text.

Part One - Substantive Norms: seven articles

1. Art. 1: CDF competence in this area; **judgment of cardinals, patriarchs, legates, bishops, and other physical persons in c. 1405 §3**

2. Art. 2: **Delicts against the faith: heresy, apostasy, and schism**

3. Art. 3: Delicts against the sanctity of the Eucharist:

- §1. 1° Violation of consecrated species.
- 2° Illegitimate attempt to celebrate the Eucharist.
- 3° Simulation of the same.
- 4° Prohibited concelebration with ministers of ecclesial communities which do not have apostolic succession and do not recognize the sacramental dignity of priestly ordination.

§2. Sacrilegious consecration of one species without the other or both species outside the Eucharist.

4. Art. 4: Delicts against the sanctity of penance:

- §1. 1° Absolution of accomplice.
- 2° **Attempted sacramental absolution or prohibited hearing of confession.**
- 3° **Simulated sacramental absolution.**
- 4° Solicitation in confession to sin with confessor.
- 5° Violation of the sacramental seal, **direct and indirect.**

§2. Recording and transmission of sacramental confessions.

5. Art. 5: **Attempted ordination of a woman.**

6. Art. 6: **Delict of clerical sexual abuse of a minor below 18 or of a person who habitually has only the imperfect use of reason; clerical acquisition, possession, or distribution of pornographic images of minors under 14.**

7. Art. 7: Prescription of criminal action regarding reserved delicts: **20 years from delict or from 18 years of age in case of sexual abuse with CDF option to derogate from prescription in individual cases.**

Part Two - Procedural Norms: twenty four articles

Title 1: constitution/competence of tribunal

8. Art. 8: Broad CDF tribunal competence in above matters.

9. Art. 9: Judges of CDF tribunal; Prefect's presidency role..

10. Art. 10: Qualifications of CDF judges: priests with JCD.

11. Art. 11: Qualifications of promoter of justice: priests with JCD.

12. Art. 12: Qualifications of notary and chancellor: priests.

13. Art. 13: Qualifications of advocate and procurator: priests with JCD.

14. Art. 14: Qualifications of officials in other tribunals: priests.

15. Art. 15: **Possible CDF dispensation from priesthood/JCD requirements.**

16. Art. 16: Referral of case to CDF by ordinary/hierarchy; CDF disposition of matter and exclusive appellate competency.

17. Art. 17: Direct referral of case to CDF without preliminary investigation in diocese; CDF conducting of such an investigation.

18. Art. 18: **CDF sanation of merely procedural irregularities in cases forwarded to it.**

19. Art. 19: Possible judicial imposition of precautionary measures of c. 1722 at promoter of justice's request; **possible imposition of such measures by ordinary even during preliminary investigation.**

20. Art. 20: Exclusive appellate competence of CDF tribunal.

Title 2: Procedure to be followed in judicial trial:

21. Art. 21: §1. Requirement of judicial process for reserved cases in principle.

§2. 1° **By way of exception CDF option to authorize administrative process including perpetual expiatory penalties.**

and faculties of canon law.

Another item I am pleased to report is the positive financial position of the Society at the end of the just-completed fiscal year. Contributing to that position was our efforts to identify ways to reduce expenses that are effective and efficient yet do not result in a reduction in services. Examples of such savings included introducing for example, new procedures for printing and mailing the CLSA Newsletter, convention brochure, and Proceedings; printing and formatting alternatives for publications; lower cost options for Board of Governors meeting arrangements; conference calls rather than in-person meetings when possible; and more limited travel. We hope to continue to seek ways of reducing costs yet maintaining a high level of service to members and those with whom we come in contact.

In the past, the CLSA worked closely with the USCCB Committee on Canonical Affairs on the Tribunal Review and Evaluation Process. As a result of the recent conference restructuring process the USCCB is no longer able to provide assistance in the Tribunal review process. Reviews con-



SUBMITTED RESOLUTION

Title: Provide the *Canon Law Digest* On-Line

Statements of Rationale:

Whereas the *Canon Law Digest* continues to be a most valuable research asset for canonists, even though it has long been handicapped by a publication time-lag, that is, a volume appears several years after the issuance of documents; and

Whereas it is now possible to post documents on line so that they are available in electronic form almost immediately upon issuance, and it is possible to keep them available permanently, and it is possible to index them for rapid searchability and ready recovery, and

Whereas the Publications Advisory Board is presently investigating the possibilities of such a conversion of the *Digest* to an electronic format and would welcome the support and encouragement, both moral and financial, of the membership,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT

The Board of Governors direct the

Publications Advisory Board to expedite its investigation of providing the Canon Law *Digest* on-line, and, if the project seems feasible and affordable, proceed with all deliberate speed to set in motion the process of on-line conversion, indexing documents by canons, chronology, source, and subject matter, maintaining permanent access, constant updating, and easy downloadability.

The Committee shall report its finding to the Board and membership within a year.

Implementation by means of:

Intensified consultation and study by the Publications Advisory Board.

Anticipated cost: \$5,000

Cost supplied by the CLSA from unrestricted, general operations funds.

Note: The resolution leaves open various avenues, for example: 1) whether or not the printed version of the *Digest* should be continued in its present form, 2) whether or not the cost of the ongoing project would require subscription or access fees, even from members of the Society, 3) whether the documents would be posted on the CLSA website or elsewhere. ▼
