We Need Champions, We Need You: 2017 National Library Legislative Day

Every year a few good men (and women, too) gather in Washington, DC to share the experience of meeting our federal representatives and reminding them how essential libraries are and how legislation impacts libraries in our state. The next National Library Legislation Days (NLLD) are Monday, May 1, and Tuesday, May 2, 2017.

So what really happens? First, you spend a day being briefed on the legislation that affects libraries. At the end of the day, the Tennessee team huddles to create a game plan. We decide who will be responsible for key points. Each person volunteers for the legislation that has significance to them and will see the representatives they have a connection with or are interested in meeting.

The next day, Tennessee Tuesday, the team starts their day with donuts and coffee with our senators. Then we put our strategy in action to fit in as many of our legislators as possible. We travel through the historic halls of the federal buildings with other



library advocates while vying for the elected officials' attention. With our carefully-prepared plans, we meet each official with targeted information and the strengths of our best advocates: you.

Tennessee Libraries (TL)

Tennessee Libraries (TL) is TLA's quarterly journal, first published in 1948 as the *Tennessee Librarian*. It has been published exclusively online since 2002, and online archives include issues since 1989. We publish professional and scholarly articles on all aspects of library and information services in Tennessee, as well as evaluative reviews of current books with a Tennessee connection. One or two issues a year include articles based on presentations from the annual TLA conference, and the last issue of the year traditionally features a bibliography of Tennessee-related books published the previous year. In addition to submitted articles, the journal features a regular technology column written by David Ratledge and a column on intellectual freedom written by members of the TLA Intel-

lectual Freedom Committee. *Tennessee Libraries* has also published columns on library staff development and school libraries in the past, but these columnist positions are vacant right now, so please contact me if you are interested in writing a column. TLA's Publications Advisory Board provides oversight for the journal.

We welcome manuscripts of all types—primary research reports, interviews, service or facility spotlights, case studies, etc. Authors may choose to submit a manuscript for consideration as a peer-reviewed article. Library professionals and staff from around Tennessee serve on *TL's* editorial board as peer reviewers, and we are always happy to consider new applications to serve on the editorial board. The *TL* Call for Papers details the requirements for a peer reviewed

manuscript and explains the other types of manuscripts we accept. We accept manuscripts all year long, but the Call for Papers also provides manuscript due dates for consideration for each issue (see <http://www.tnla.org/?33>). A thank you is due to both past and future authors, staff, and readers of *Tennessee Libraries*. As with everything in TLA, and indeed in most libraries, the journal is a collaborative effort that is successful only because of the support of TLA members.
