La Pequeña Havana: A Real and an Imagined Community

After a brief session in the hotel focusing on an overview of Cuban immigration to the Miami area, workshop participants will travel by bus to various sites within Miami that are related to the Cuban-American experience such as Freedom Tower, Ermita de la Caridad, and Museo Cubano.
