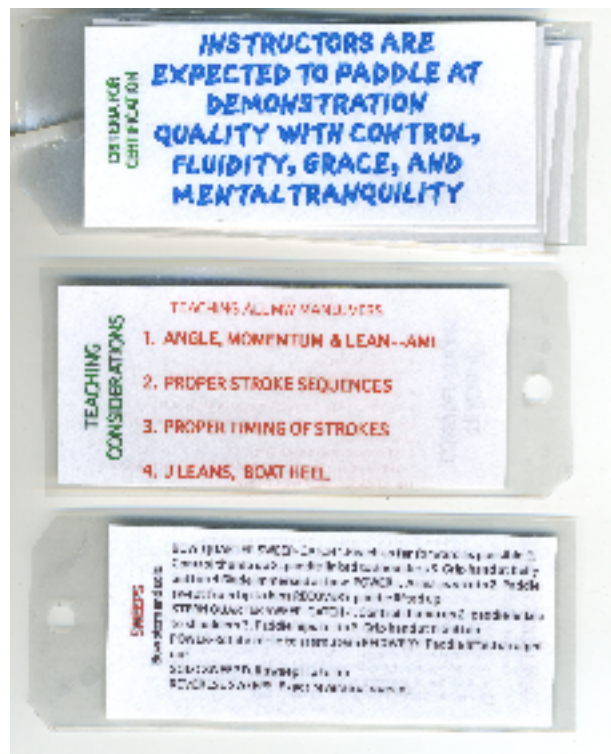


ICW Flash Cards

Anyone who has taught an IDW in any of the disciplines knows how much material must be covered in a very limited amount of time. We also know that there isn't one place for a candidate to find easily accessible outlines of all they are required to know and perform.

I had a couple of requests for more detailed stroke analysis that could be used as a memory aide, so I decided to create a set of cards which contain most of what is covered in a canoe IDW. There are now 18 cards in the series.. Before an IDW, I print them out double sided, cut them out, laminate them, punch them so that I can string them together with a small cable tie and give them to the candidates. This way they have a detailed memory aid that can be carried in the boat or clipped to the deck of a kayak, and will survive immersion. There are now 18 separate cards which back to back make 9 laminated cards. Some of the cards will be the same for all disciplines, but obviously stroke mechanics will vary, so new cards would have to be made. PDFs of all of the cards available



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CONSIDERATIONS

SKILL PRESENTATIONS (strokes and maneuvers)

1. Make sure the venue is SAFE
2. Make sure you can be heard and seen at all times
3. MOTIVATE-Why would you want to learn this
4. D/3-DESCRIBE what you are going to do. DEMONSTRATE model slowly, DO Have them perform then give feedback

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TEACHING ALL MW MANEUVERS

1. ANGLE, MOMENTUM & LEAN--AML
2. PROPER STROKE SEQUENCES
3. PROPER TIMING OF STROKES
4. J LEANS, BOAT HEEL

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SLICE STROKE

Bow, solo

CATCH-1. Vertical paddle ahaft 2. Torso Rotation 3. Grip hand slightly bent 4. Leading edge of blade is set against hull
 POWER-1. Paddle is pulled back to hips 2. Angle of blade is held constant throughout stroke RECOVERY-Feathered back for next stroke

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
