Presenting: *“From the Couch to the Bus Depot to the Mall to Work: Understanding the Relationship of the Post-Psychotic Adjustment Process to Recovery”*

Psychosis is a frightening, and often traumatic experience that creates disrupted cognitive function and leaves an uncertain aftermath. Until recently, a predictable trajectory for recovery with documentable clinical milestones has remained unreported (Moller, 2010). The Milestones of Adjustment Post-Psychosis Recovery Model (MAPP)[™] describes a dynamic four-phase progression from cognitive dissonance to insight followed by achievement of cognitive constancy that culminates in a return to ordinariness. The entire process can take from 3-5 years depending on response to medications. This workshop will provide an introduction to the MAPP[™] recovery model with implications for all members of the mental health treatment team. Factors that enhance and delay successful post-psychotic adjustment such as timing of psychoeducation, support of case managers, and fine-tuning of medications will be discussed. Implications of the MAPP[™] recovery model for mental health care systems and generalization to non-psychotic disorders will be discussed. A MAPP[™] Recovery Model Treatment Plan will be provided.

Goals and objectives:

1. Describe the four phases of the Milestones of Adjustment Post-Psychosis Recovery Model (MAPP[™]).
2. Describe treatment characteristics and interventions related to each phase.
3. Discuss implications of the MAPP[™] recovery model for members of the treatment team and the mental health system.
4. Develop a treatment plan that will promote adherence based on the MAPP[™] recovery model.

Dr. Mary D. Moller, DNP, ARNP, PMHCNS-BC, CPRP, FAAN is an internationally known psychiatric mental health nurse clinician, researcher, educator, and presenter. She is an advanced registered nurse practitioner who is dually certified as a clinical specialist in adult psychiatric-mental health nursing and a psychiatric rehabilitation practitioner. She is an Associate Professor at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, WA where she is coordinator of the psychiatric nurse practitioner Doctor of Nursing Practice program. Her teaching foci include psychopharmacology, psychopathology, group therapy, 1:1 psychotherapy, mental health assessment and advanced practice nursing including legislative activity related to independent practice.

Dr. Patricia A. Zapf, Ph.D.

Presenting : *“Best Practices in the Evaluation of Adjudicative Competence”*

This workshop covers the legal foundations for adjudicative competence, including new developments in the conceptualization of the Dusky standard, as well as practical and theoretical issues in competency evaluation. Competency assessment instruments are reviewed as is the utility of a rational decision making model for case formulation. Foundations for competency evaluation are reviewed, the specific abilities to be evaluated are delineated, case formulation and conceptualization is considered, and communicating opinions about competence in the written report and through expert testimony is discussed. Participants are encouraged to discuss their difficult cases.

Goals and objectives:

1. Describe important legal cases that deal with issues relevant to the interpretation of adjudicative competence standards and statutes.
2. Describe developments in the conceptualization of the Dusky Standard.
3. Describe the utility of using Competence Assessment Instruments to guide the evaluation.
4. Describe the process for opinion formulation in competency evaluations.
5. Describe required, appropriate, and inappropriate report contents.
6. Describe the process for communicating opinions about competence in the written report and through expert testimony.

Dr. Patricia Zapf obtained her PhD in Clinical Forensic psychology from Simon Fraser University in Canada and currently holds the position of Professor in the Department of Psychology and John Jay College of Criminal Justice, The City University of New York, and Director for CONCEPT Professional Training. She is the Editor of the American Psychology-Law Society book series; Associate Editor of Law and Human Behavior; and is on the Editorial Boards for 5 journals in psychology and law. Dr. Zapf is on the Board of Directors for the International Association of Forensic Mental Health Services and has served as President of the American Psychology-Law Society (AP-LS; Division 41, APA). She has published 9 books and manuals and more than 100 articles and chapters, mainly on the forensic evaluation and the conceptualization of criminal competencies. Dr. Zapf was appointed Fellow of the American Psychological Association and Distinguished Member of American Psychology-Law Society in 2006 for outstanding contributions to the field of psychology and law for her work in competency evaluation. In addition to her research, she serves as a consultant to various criminal justice and policy organizations and has a private practice in forensic evaluation. She has conducted over 2500 forensic evaluations in both the United States and Canada and has served as an expert witness in a number of cases, including the competency hearing of Jose Padilla. Dr. Zapf is the author of Best Practices in the Evaluation of Competence to Stand Trial; editor of Forensic Assessments in Criminal and Civil Law: A Handbook for Lawyers; and Editor-in-Chief of the APA Handbook of Forensic Psychology. She served on the National Judicial College’s Mental Competency—Best Practices Model panel of experts and trains legal and mental health professionals throughout the United States on best practices in forensic evaluation.

Presenting : *“Sometimes equal & never separate: The interrelatedness of mental health and substance use disorders ”*

The presentation will focus on the interrelated complexities of substance use disorders and mental health disorders. The Co-occurring “lens” will be presented as a useful framework for risk assessment and diagnostic evaluation. The goal of the presentation is to increase knowledge and skills in treatment planning, intervention, and discharge planning for attendees working with co-occurring conditions. The content of the presentation will be delivered in a practical manner that can be easily applied to real life work situations.

Goals and objectives:

1. Implement a shared language among team members regarding co-occurring needs and treatment options.
2. Recognize the impact of specific substances and their relationship to the most prevalent inpatient mental health diagnosis, assessment and presentation.
3. Avoid diagnostic errors that often occur in co-occurring situations.
4. Reference evidenced based models that are effective in treating co-occurring conditions including IDDT and Motivational Interviewing.
5. Develop treatment plans that address co-occurring needs.
6. Develop discharge plans that address co-occurring needs.
7. Increase understanding of the SUD treatment system including applicable licensing, regulations, and treatment programming.
8. Learn effective risk assessment in co-occurring populations.

Steve Denny has worked professionally in the field of Behavioral health since 2002 and has been employed by Four County Mental Health Center since 2005. He currently serves as director of clinical services, which includes general outpatient services, crisis services, and substance abuse services. He has supervised special projects serving targeted populations in geriatric mental health, early childhood mental health services, at risk dual diagnosis populations, and served on multiple community and State organizations.

Presenting : *“Community Ethics: Effectively Incorporating Daily Risk Management and Ethical Reasoning in Behavioral Health Settings”*

This workshop translates fundamental ethical and risk management principles in daily behavioral health practice, including special issues around rural settings, consumer choice, protection of self, others, and the vulnerable, and interdisciplinary treatment settings. In particular, we will look at the thorny challenge of teaching moment-to-moment ethical reasoning for staff who work in the most complex situations - chaotic milieu settings with severely ill individuals. Full-spectrum professional development as well as development and maintenance of a living risk management program will be discussed as possible answers to these difficult problem areas.

Goals and objectives:

1. Identify the key elements of an integrated risk management/ethical reasoning process within the oversight structure of a behavioral health setting.
2. Explain the criteria of a “living,” responsive risk management program for your behavioral health setting.
3. List at least 2 actions you can take when you return to work that will improve the readiness of your internal professional community for the risk management situations they encounter.

Dr. Barnum, Diplomate of the National Board of Certified Clinical Hypnotherapists, completed his doctoral training in clinical psychology with a specialization in health psychology at The University of Kansas. After his internship at Temple University Health Sciences, he began a 20-year career in community mental health, with particular emphasis in establishing and expanding clinical training programs as a means for developing professional staff in rural and underserved areas. Currently, he is the Clinical Director and Director of Clinical Training at Larned State Hospital as well as a Co-Owner of The Family Therapy Institute Midwest. He has served as an adjunct professor in the Department of Psychology at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, University of Kansas, and Benedictine College. He has been an Ambassador for the National Health Service Corps, is a past-President of the Kansas Psychological Association, and served on the Continuing Education Committee of the American Psychological Association. Dr. Barnum is a frequent presenter at local, national and international conferences on topics including diagnosis, ethics, risk management, clinical training and supervision, family psychology, autism spectrum disorders, treating family injustice, elements of effective psychological treatment, and Ericksonian approaches to treatment, among others. He has published work in the treatment of children affected by abuse and foster care, health psychology, and enhancing access to mental health care. He is currently co-Chair of the Hospital Ethics Committee at Larned State Hospital. Dr. Barnum is an energetic, engaging, and knowledgeable trainer for new and experienced providers alike.

Reservations: Please submit your reservation form and fee as soon as possible as conference seating is limited. Reservations will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.


