We are thinking about Paris in December, when the world will decide about a climate change treaty. We are mindful of the dire consequences of 3 to 4 degrees of warming.

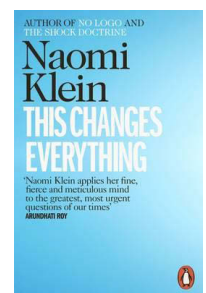
Our prayers can be mindful of global leaders needing to make decisions which are responsible, achievable, forward-thinking, so that future generations will be grateful for the people of 2015.

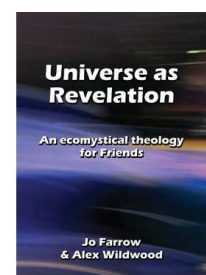

With so many environmental challenges, it can be revitalising to focus a little on things that are going well. One of our own local examples is the Vasse-Wonnerup Estuary near the town of Busselton.



The place is a designated Ramsar site of particular importance as a dry-season habitat for waterbirds. Perhaps 20,000 waterbirds use the estuary. There have been concerns about the declining health of the estuary, including mass fish kill incidents. Happily there are signs of improvement in the last five years. There's also just been an announcement of 30 different projects that aim to improve water quality and management of water through the entire catchment.
