



## **2017 AIA Wyoming Call for Entries – Design Awards due July 7, 2017**

### **Objective**

The AIA Wyoming Design Awards Program recognizes excellence in design, planning, and construction of projects located anywhere in the world that are designed by AIA architects registered and licensed in Wyoming.

The intent of the design awards program is to honor the highest standards of design in response to user requirements, site, context, climate, and environment. Each entry, regardless of size, budget, location, or classification, is judged individually on the basis of total design merit.

AIA Wyoming members are invited to submit entries regardless of project size, budget, style, or building type. Entries are welcomed and encouraged from both established and new designers and practitioners and from individuals or firms of any size. Residential, educational, commercial, public or civic, adaptive reuse or historic, interiors, small projects, planning, and unbuilt buildings are eligible (defined below).

Awards are based on honor, merit, and citation. The jury will decide the type and number of awards. Certificates will be presented to award winning AIA members in good standing, and their projects will be presented at the Awards Celebration on September 22, 2017.

### **Eligibility**

AIA Wyoming Architect members, assigned or unassigned, who are licensed in the state of Wyoming are eligible to submit projects located anywhere in the world. An unassigned AIA Wyoming Architect member is defined as a member in AIA Wyoming who is already assigned to an out of state AIA component. Individuals who are not AIA Wyoming members are encouraged to apply for membership ([info@aia-wyoming.org](mailto:info@aia-wyoming.org)) in order to participate in the awards program.

Individuals or firms are encouraged to re-enter projects previously submitted if they did not win an award. Projects that have received an AIA Wyoming award in a previous year are not eligible for the 2017 awards. However, projects that have won an unbuilt award can be resubmitted as a built project.

There is no limit to the number of projects that may be entered by a firm.

### **Release Waiver**

By submitting an entry, entrants take full responsibility for the accuracy of all information submitted and warrant that all necessary permissions have been obtained from others who may have rights to the work, including photographs. Entrants further acknowledge that no royalty or compensation is due anyone, hold AIA Wyoming, its sponsors, Board of Directors, staff, consultants and members harmless from all liability and grant to AIA Wyoming the non-exclusive right to publish, reproduce and distribute copies of the original entry and the associated photographs and images.

## Categories

- Residential: includes but not limited to - single family, multi-family, condominiums, apartments, affordable, senior centers, lofts.
- Educational: includes but not limited to - learning institutions, K-12 public schools, community colleges, universities, vocational, daycare, research centers.
- Commercial: includes but not limited to - office buildings, retail, restaurants, bars, hotels, motels, auto dealerships, shopping centers.
- Public or Civic: includes but not limited to - recreational facilities, libraries, town halls, performing arts centers, firehouses, hospitals, museums, medical clinics, courthouses, airports, churches, parking garages, jails and prisons, police stations, bus depot, visit center.
- Adaptive Reuse or Historic: includes but not limited to - repurposing/remodel of a building to a new use, buildings (not just those recognized with a local, state or national historic designation) age fifty years and older and also includes all four approaches: preservation, rehabilitation, restoration and reconstruction as defined by the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties
- Interiors: includes but not limited to an interiors project (project that does not include work to the exterior of the building)
- Small Project (restricted budget or inventive solution): includes but not limited to a built project that constructs a program for habitation. Any project type with a restricted budget under \$1,000,000.
- Planning: includes but not limited to large scale planning.
- Unbuilt: A project commissioned by client that may or may not be built.

## Fees

- Design Awards entry fee (non-refundable) \$175.00 each

## Publicity

All photography submitted for publicity purposes must be free of restrictions and copyrights.
