Time: Squading begins at 8:00am (Relay pairing and Target assignments)

1st relay Prep time starts at 8:25am

Shooting begins at 8:30am

Shooting ends between 1:00-2:00

Affiliations: Open to the public. NRA membership, not required, but recommended

Classifications: NRA/CMP classifications are used.

New shooters will shoot as “Unclassified” and scored in the Master’s class until they have logged 240 shots in a temporary log book and/or receive their classification from the NRA.

Minimum Equipment Required:

- Any center fire Rifle with iron sights (Match or service rifle**)
- Eye Protection
- Ear Protection
- (2) 5 round Magazines(or (2) 10 round Magazines (this will depend on Match or service rifle**)
- Ammunition – 88 to 130 rounds
- Scope or Binoculars
- Chair (optional)

Advanced Shooters Equipment:

- All of the above plus
- Shooting Mat
- Shooting Jacket
- Shooting Glove(s)
- Shooting Stool
- Shooter’s Data Book (optional)

Match Description:

The National Match Course follows NRA/CMP rules.

The 80NMC (Registered NRA match) will run as 2 relays.

Course of fire is:

Stage 1: Slow fire @ 200yds, 20 rounds in 20min – offhand (standing position, no slings)

Stage 2: Rapid fire @ 200yds, (2) strings of 10 rounds in 60secs each – sitting position
(requires a reload during the course of fire)

Stage 3: Rapid fire @ 300yds, (2) strings of 10 rounds in 70secs each – prone position
(requires a reload during the course of fire)

Stage 4: Slow fire @ 300yds (simulated 600yrd target), 20 rounds in 20min – prone position

All stages are preceded by a 2 min sighting in period (2 rnds in 2 mins)

** you will need to consult the NRA/CMP rule book for an exact ruling of a Service Rifle vs a Match Rifle, but in a brief description:

A Service Rifle must have the same exterior silhouette as a standard issued US military rifle. (some internal modifications are allowed). [ie: M16 (A2 or A4), M14 (M1A), or M1 (Garand)]

A Match Rifle is any other rifle in any caliber, but must have iron sights.

Space gun (match rifle) is usually an AR based rifle with a fully adjustable stock and iron sights.
